5. Approval of Minutes

A. Board Meeting – December 13, 2017

6. Communications

Mr. Diel congratulated Dick Barnes as the newest Trustee of the CUMTD Board. He replaced Don Uchtmann who retired from the Board after December.

Mr. Cho entered the meeting.

7. Presentation by Martin, Hood, Friese & Associates – CUMTD FY2017 Audit

Mitch Schluter, partner in charge of engagement at Martin, Hood, Friese & Associates, summarized CUMTD's FY2017 audit beginning 7/1/16 and ending 6/30/17.

8. Reports

A. Managing Director

Mr. Gnadt reviewed the ridership and financial numbers for November and December. December ridership has increased 7% from FY2017 due in large part to additional UI school days and the resumption of regular routes on Green Street. Expenses in December increased 18.30% from last December due to earned time/vacation and Workers' Compensation payouts. MTD began to distribute free Veteran passes at the beginning of 2018. As of January 22nd, 91 passes had been issued.

13		and recommended approval of Ontario Investment, Inc. for leasing services at a fixed rate of 2.388% from
14		2/1/18 through 1/31/19.

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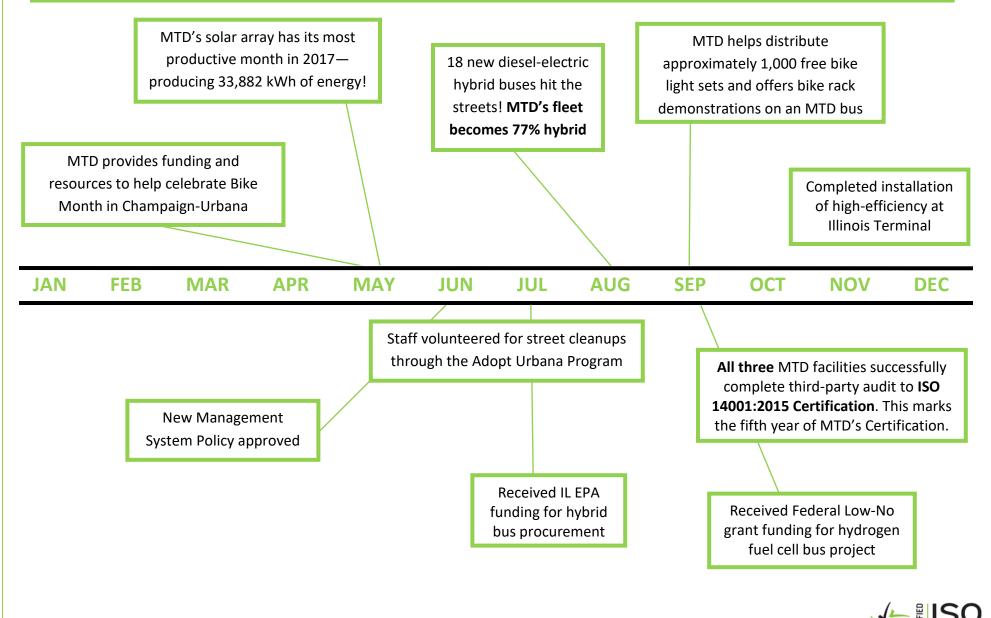

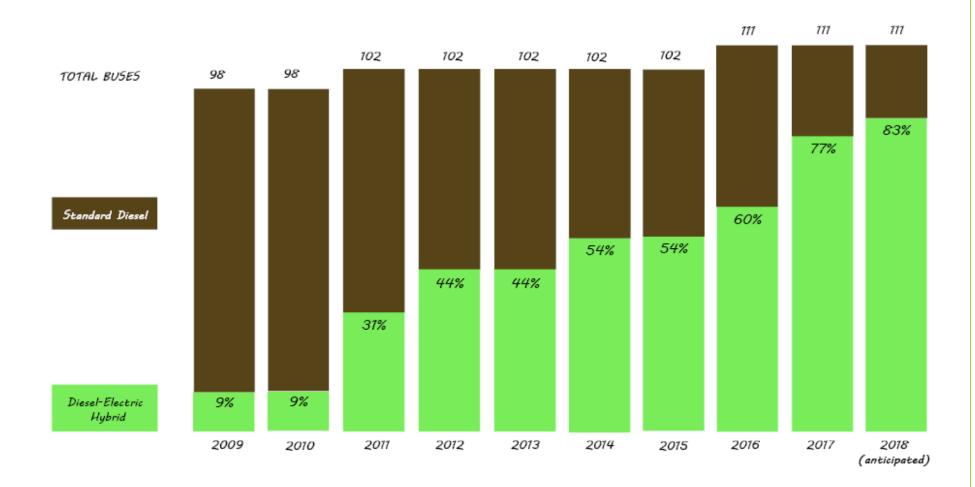

The ISO 14001 Standard was updated and reissued in September 2015 to respond to the latest trends and ensure compatibility with other management systems.

There were a number of instances of continual improvement of the management of significant aspects demonstrated during this visit. These include improvements in rechargeable battery usage, paper use, waste reduction, and reduced use of virgin refrigerants in bus service. Several observations for continual improvement offered at the last visit were acted upon by MTD. Commitment of resources to manage environmental risks at MTD demonstrates management's awareness of business risks associated with environmental performance.

Governance processes have been upgraded to assure continued conformance with new and revised requirements of the 2015 Standard.

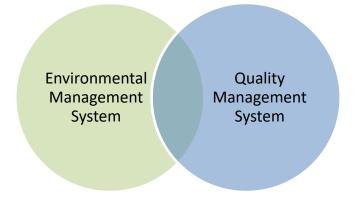

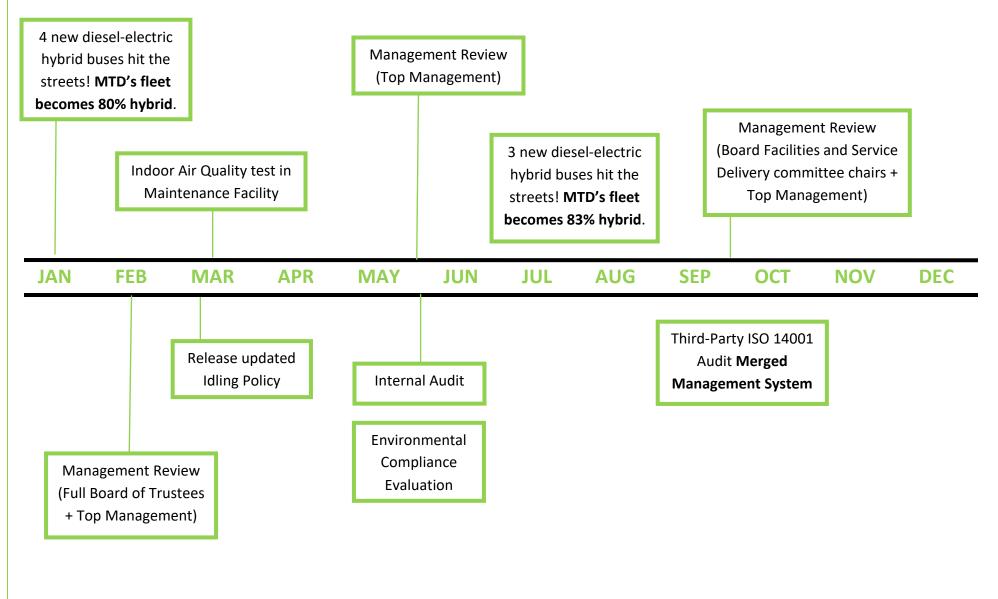

Idling Policy

POLICY: NO DISTRICT VEHICLE IS TO IDLE MORE THAN THREE (3) MINUTES.

PURPOSE OF POLICY: to protect public health and improve the environment by reducing noise and emissions while conserving fuel. Less idling time reduces wear and tear on engines, lengthens engine life, saves money, improves the performance of Diesel Particulate Filters, and contributes to a cleaner environment.

This Policy applies to all District employees and all District vehicles. This includes fixed-route, ADA, Direct Services, SafeRides, Street Supervisors, and C-CARTS.

To safely park a vehicle, the vehicle must be turned off and the master switch set to the NIGHT PARK position, allowing the marker lights, radio, GPS, cameras, etc. to continue to operate.

The following outlines situations in which the Idling Policy may be applicable, noting any exceptions.

Layover or Standby

If a layover or standby is expected to exceed three minutes, Operator must shut down the engine within 30 seconds of arrival at the layover or standby point. If layover or standby unexpectedly exceeds three minutes, Operator must shut down the engine after three minutes of idling. This includes waiting for passenger and in between pick-ups for small vehicles.

Layover/Standby Exception:

If a layover or standby exceeds 30 minutes, Operator must restart the bus every 30 minutes for a 10-minute period of time. This allows the battery pack to recycle and prevents the vehicle's electronics from draining the system.

Fuel Station

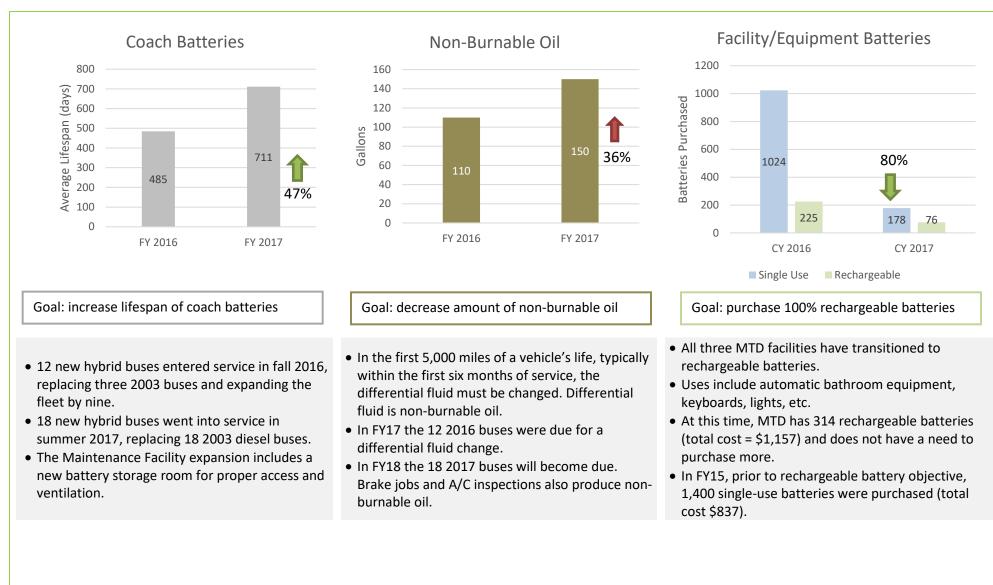
All vehicles parked in line at the fuel station should be parked safely and shut off in the STOP ENGINE position.

Fuel Station Exceptions:

- 1) When temperature is below 45°F; or
- 2) Between the following times, as noted on the Fuel Station signage:
 - a. 4:00 pm 8:30 pm;
 - b. 10:30 pm 12:00 am; and
 - c. 2:30 am 4:30 am.

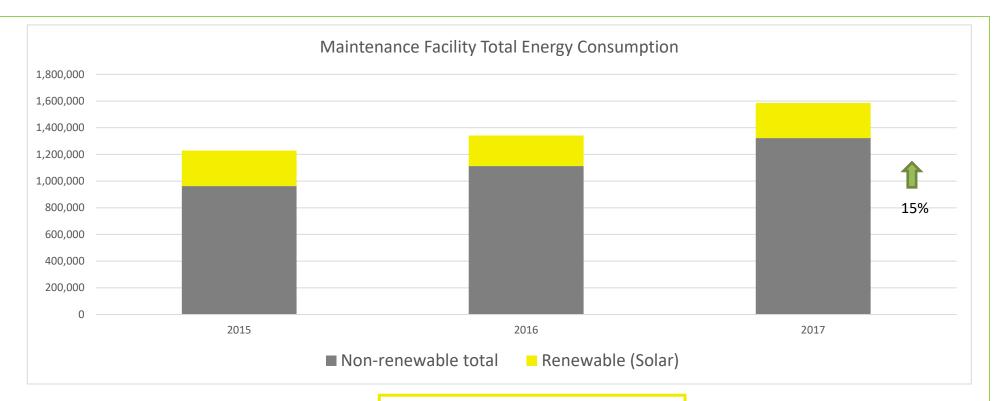
POLICY EXCEPTIONS:

- 1) When temperature is above 80°F or below 45°F;
- 2) Bus may idle during mandatory pre-trip inspection and while the bus is airing up. After completion of inspection, turn bus off if more than three minutes remain until pull-out time;
- 3) During universal transfers;
- 4) Severe weather event not covered by the temperature exception such as sleet, freezing rain, snow, etc.;
- 5) Emergency situations;
- 6) CDL training requirements;
- 7) Fuel Station line (see above); or
- 8) Other maintenance that requires engine on.

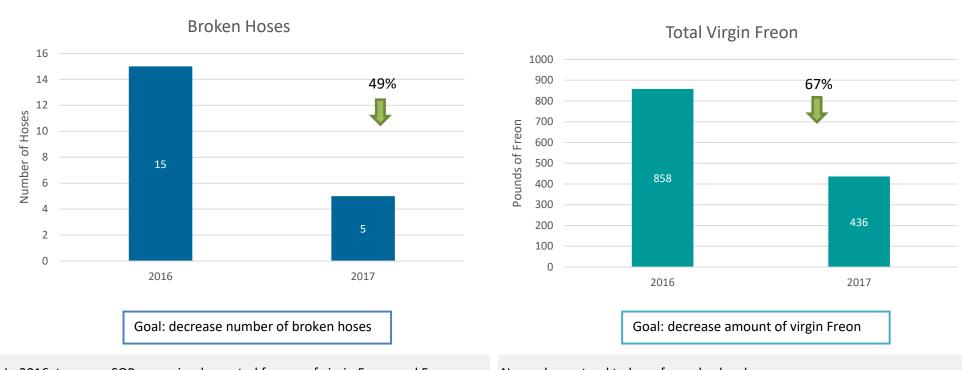

Newer buses tend to have fewer broken hoses.

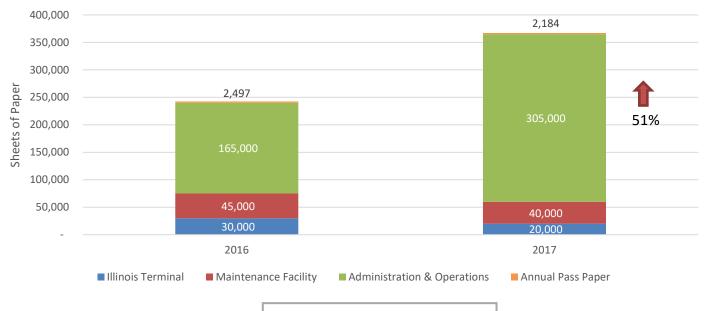
12 new hybrid buses went into service in fall 2016, replacing three 2003 buses and expanding the fleet by nine buses.

Paper Consumption



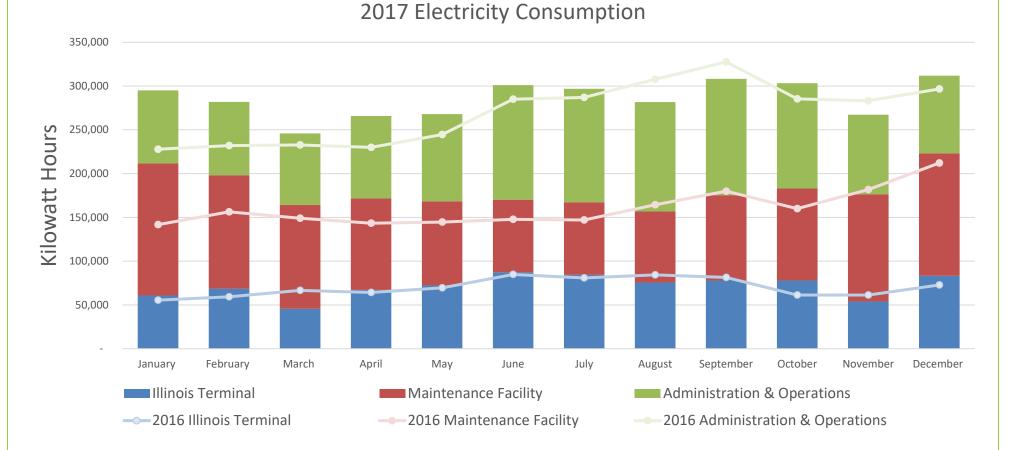

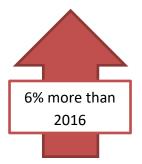
Staff is monitoring paper consumption and working to reduce from several angles:

- Mobile ticketing will potentially reduce annual pass paper and paper transfer slips. Although not included in our paper monitoring, about 1M transfer slips are purchased annually. Scheduled for mid-Spring 2018.
- Fuel management system will digitize some maintenance processes.
- New digital work order system in maintenance will allow employees to create work orders without the need to print (December 2017).
- Customer Service Department working to digitize processes. Scheduled for Spring 2018.

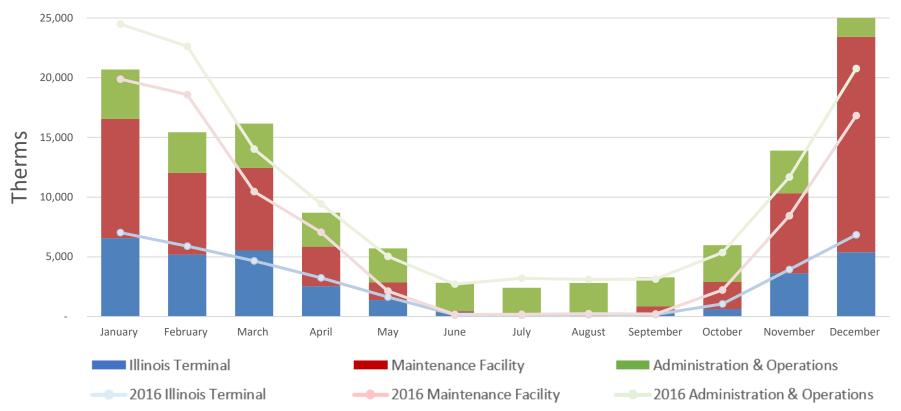

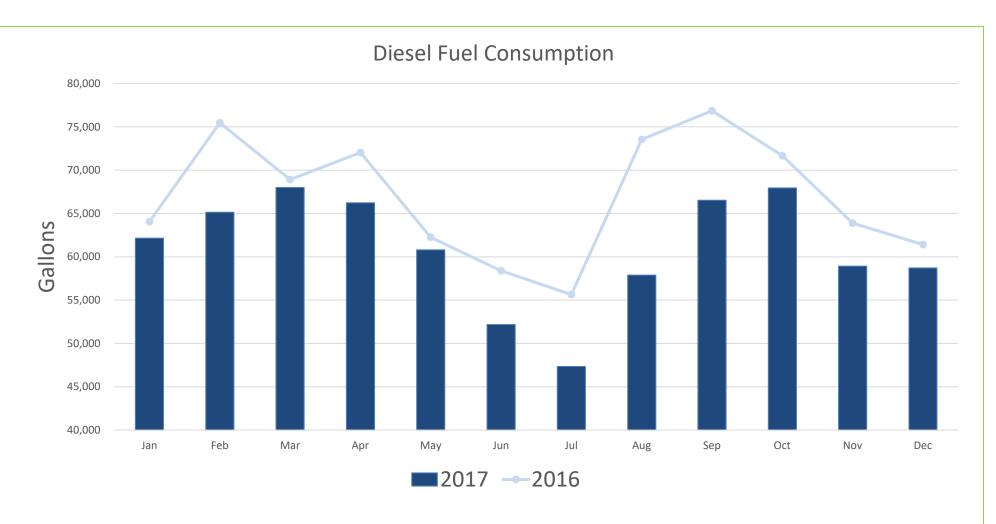


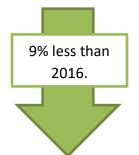

2017 Water Consumption





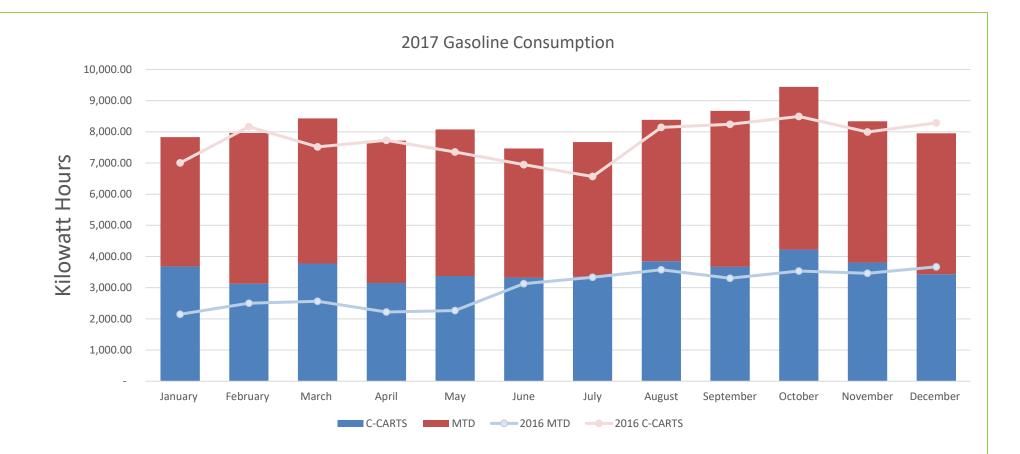


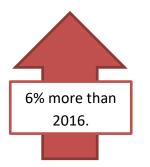

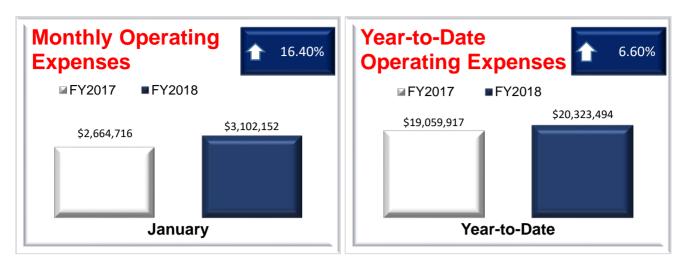


January ridership was up 3.3% from last January. The number of weekdays (22), Saturdays (4) and Sundays (4) is the same as last year, including the same number of UI days. The only difference in schedule is that Champaign had two fewer school days this January than last January. The average temperature was 10 degrees colder, precipitation was down from 2.44" to 0.84", and gas was up \$0.20. Basically, it was colder with less snow which could help explain the ridership change. This was the second highest ridership January on record, although only slightly.



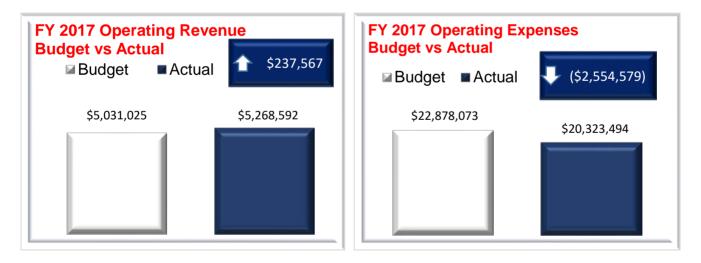
January 2018 operating revenue was \$741,955 or 0.6% above January 2017 (\$737,305). Year-to-date operating revenue was \$5,268,592 or 3.3% above FY2017 (\$5,098,197).

OPERATING EXPENSES



January operating expenses were \$3,102,152 or 16.4% above January 2017 (\$2,664,716). Year-to-date operating expenses were \$20,323,494 or 6.6% above FY2017 (\$19,059,917). The increase in expenses can mostly be attributed to: 1) Worker's Comp, Earned Time payouts, Early Retirement payouts, IMRF Accelerated Payments, fuel costs, and MCORE Engineering expenses.

Year-to-date operating revenues through January are \$237,567 above budget while operating expenses are \$2,554,579 under budget.

MANAGING DIRECTOR'S NOTES

*The ESMS Team will be conducting its Management Review presentation at the February Board meeting.

*While we await word on the two grant applications we have submitted for the Illinois Terminal Expansion, several other activities related to due diligence analysis and partnerships relative to the ITE project are still in process.

*The Farnsworth Group will begin its partner interviews within the first week of March. This begins a monthslong process of gathering information from the partners and working through the pre-visualization concept.

*Service began to Carle at the Fields at Curtis Road and I57 on February 26, 2018. The 14 Navy is now serving the complex via Fields South Drive. At the same time, we instituted a minor route change to the 9A/9B Brown to enter the E14 parking lot to serve a hole that was created by lengthening and changing the Navy route.

*The launch of the Token Transit App for mobile fares is expected to launch in March. Token Transit will allow riders to buy and validate fares using their smartphones. If you've ever used or seen a mobile boarding pass at an airport, this will be similar to that. The only difference is that the pass will not be read by an electronic eye, it will be validated by the operator. This method does not require any equipment to be purchased so there is no capital investment. Passengers will be able to buy single rides, monthly passes, and annual passes.

*During the recent snow and ice events at the beginning of the month, the Maintenance Department worked 12 hour shifts to ensure that our shelters and pads were kept clean and safe. There are over 100 shelters in Champaign-Urbana.

MAJOR EFFORTS

Development Efforts

Illinois Terminal Expansion – As of this writing, there still is no word on the Bus & Bus Facilities (5339) grant award notification or the TIGER grant award notification.

Route Analysis

There has been a delay in beginning the project because IDOT has requested changes to the scope for the project due to new state GATA requirements. We are down to a single item to iron out within the scope and we should be able to issue the RFP within a few weeks.

Ridership Study

This project is geared toward collecting origin and destination information for planning purposes. Though the plan is to utilize Token Transit's bluetooth beacon concept to anonymously collect the data - TT is not yet ready to launch that function.

Staff continues to work on a number of projects including:

- MCORE – Some construction could ramp up again in March.

- U of I contract – Negotiations continue.

- TapRide – the demand response ride hail app should be able to be launched with the annual service changes in August, 2018. This app will be used to schedule rides for the campus SafeRides program as well as "first mile/last mile" service in southwest Champaign.

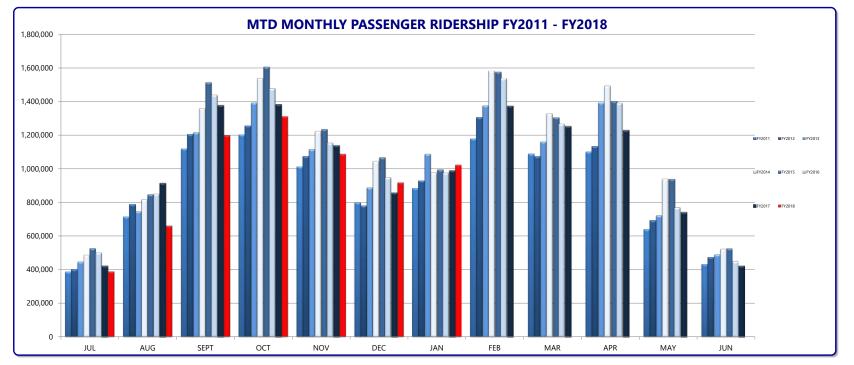

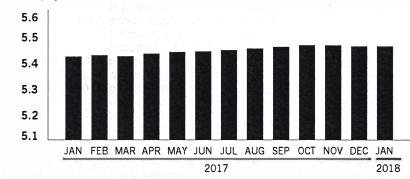

The below chart displays the most recent thirteen months of Market Value.

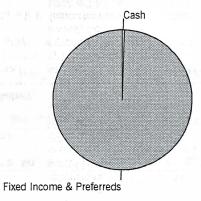

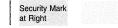

- **A.** Introduction The District will utilize Federal grant funding for the purchase of three 40-foot diesel-electric hybrid buses to replace three fifteen-year-old standard diesel buses.
- **B. Recommended Action**: Staff recommends authorization of the Managing Director to issue a purchase order in the amount of \$1,814,882 for three 40-foot diesel electric hybrid buses. The FTA grant has been submitted, reviewed by FTA, and pre-award authority has been provided. The District will not procure the vehicles until the FTA grant is fully executed.

C. Prior Trustee Action

- On September 30, 2015, the Board of Trustees provided approval to enter into a five-year bus procurement contract with New Flyer of America.
- **D. Summary:** MTD's current contract with New Flyer gives the District the ability to purchase 40-foot and 60-foot diesel-electric hybrid buses during the period 2015 to 2020. Staff request approval to exercise options on the contract by issuing a purchase order to New Flyer for three 40-foot diesel-electric hybrid buses.
- E. Background: When entering into the contract with New Flyer in 2015, the District operated 33 40-foot standard diesel buses built in 2003 with over 500,000 miles (32% of the fleet) and 12 60-foot standard diesel buses built in 2001. Today, we continue to operate 10 40-foot standard diesel buses purchased in 2003 with over 500,000 miles. The federally-defined useful life of a 40-foot bus is 12 years or 500,000 miles. The table below shows the purchases that have occurred since that time. The final row identifies the purchase associated with this request.

F. Alternatives – advantages/disadvantages

- 1. Authorize the Managing Director to issue a purchase order. The advantage of authorization is that the District would have the ability to replace aged buses with high mileage.
- 2. Do not authorize the Managing Director to issue a purchase order. This would result in the inability to purchase buses and potentially lead to service reductions.

- **G. Community Input:** This project is included in the FY 2018-2021 TIP which was published for public comment and approved by the CUUATS Technical and Policy Committees.
- **H.** Budget & Staffing Impacts: Staff does not anticipate staffing impacts related to this purchase order. Funding for this purchase will come from 100% Federal funding, no local funding will be used.
