C. Developmental Services Center (DSC) Contract

This contract is a cooperative effort for CUMTD to meet the requirements of the Americans With Disabilities Act (ADA) and DSC to provide the best possible transportation services for their clients.

MOTION by Ms. Bauer to approve the Developmental Services Contract effective July 1, 2017 through June 30, 2018 as distributed; seconded by Ms. Chaplan. Upon vote, the **MOTION CARRIED** unanimously.

D. Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) and Vehicle Lease Agreement between Champaign County and CUMTD for the Transportation Services of the Champaign County Area Rural Transit System (C-CARTS)

Champaign County contracts with CUMTD to provide transportation service outside the District's boundaries through Champaign County Area Rural Transit System (C-CARTS). The IGA and Vehicle Lease Agreement is a renewal to June 30, 2020.

MOTION by Ms. Bauer to approve the Intergovernmental Agreement and the Vehicle Lease Agreement between Champaign County and CUMTD concerning the Champaign County Area Rural Transit System; seconded by Mr. Hannon. Upon vote, the **MOTION CARRIED** unanimously.

E. Financial Audit Services Contract

The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) recommends that transit agencies engage a different auditor after five years for prudent financial oversight. The District issued a Request for Proposal (RFP), and the Evaluation Committee recommended awarding the contract to the local firm Martin, Hood, Friese & Associates for FY2017-2019 auditing services with an optional extension for FY2020-FY2021. The annual fee for FY2017 is \$28,500.

This area will be land banked for future needs of the District.

G. Rejection of Illinois Terminal Boiler Replacement Bids and Authorize Re-Bid

Ms. Sullivan stated that the Board awarded the Illinois Terminal Boiler Replacement contract as of March 28, 2017 to Reliable Plumbing & Heating Company. After review by the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT), Reliable Plumbing was unable to fulfill the Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) requirement. The next lowest bidder submitted a bid that was 33% higher. The District did not feel it was fiscally responsible to accept the significantly higher bid so would like to re-let the project with clarification regarding bidder compliance with DBE regulations.

H. Administration/Operations Building Air Conditioner Unit Replacement Contract

The 15-year old rooftop air conditioner unit at the Administration/Operations Building needs to be replaced. On March 28, 2017, the Board authorized the Managing Director to enter into a contract with Reliable Plumbing & Heating in the amount of \$97,590. However, after further review, Reliable Plumbing & Heating Company was unable to fulfill the DBE requirement. The next lowest bidder with a responsive and responsible bid was E.L. Pruitt Company at \$98,647.

MOTION by Mr. Hannon to authorize the Managing Director to enter into a contract with E.L. Pruitt Company in the amount of \$98,647 for the Administration/Operations Building Air Conditioner Unit Replacement; seconded by Ms. Chaplan. Upon vote, the **MOTION CARRIED** unanimously.

I. Illinois Terminal Lavatories and Hand Dryer Replacement Contract

The lavatories and hand dryers in Illinois Terminal's first and second floor restrooms are 17 years old and in need of replacement. The lowest bidder with a responsive and responsible bid was Davis-Houk Mechanical, Inc. in the amount of \$27,290.

MOTION by Ms. Chaplan to authorize the Managing Director to enter into a contract with Davis-Houk Mechanical, Inc. in the amount of \$27,290 for Illinois Terminal Lavatories and Hand Dryer Replacement; seconded by Ms. Bauer. Upon vote, the **MOTION CARRIED** unanimously.

J. Maintenance Truck Replacement Contract

The Maintenance truck to be replaced is 15 years old and in poor condition. This vehicle is eligible for replacement. Two bids were received and both were considered responsive and responsible. Due to the tight timeframe to complete this project before fiscal year-end, only Rick Ridings Ford, Inc. was able to guarantee delivery of the vehicle by 6/30/17. The Managing Director determined that an emergency procurement was necessary to secure the funding and was unable to delay the contract award prior to Board approval.

MOTION by Mr. Hannon to retroactively authorize the Managing Director to enter into a contract with Rick Ridings Ford, Inc. in the amount of \$38,671 for a new Maintenance truck; seconded by Ms. Chaplan. Upon vote, the **MOTION CARRIED** unanimously.

K. <u>Rejection of 59 East Chester Street and 207 South Water Street Demolition Bids and Authorize Re-</u> <u>Bid without DBE Requirement</u>

In March, the Board approved the rejection of bids and re-bid for the demolition of 59 East Chester and 207 South Water due to bidder confusion with DBE requirements. The project was re-let with DBE requirements. In the second round, the two lowest bidders were not able to fulfill the DBE requirements. The next lowest bidder that satisfied the DBE requirement had a bid that was substantially higher. Staff recommends rejecting the bids again and re-bidding the project without the DBE requirement. The DBE requirement is not mandatory in this project due to the funding source. These buildings are in poor condition and need to be taken down as soon as possible.



RIDERSHIP




May ridership was 742,253 or 3.71% below May, 2016 (770,860). Year-to-date ridership was 11,674,826 or 5.23% below FY2016 (12,318,857).

OPERATING REVENUE




May, 2017 operating revenue was \$703,810 or 4.80% below May, 2016 (\$739,249). Year-to-date operating revenue was \$8,405,379 or 1.50% above FY2016 (\$8,284,849).

OPERATING EXPENSES



May operating expenses were \$2,727,844 or 1.60% above May, 2016 (\$2,685,735). Year-to-date operating expenses were \$30,032,431 or 2.30% above FY2016 (\$29,358,212).

YEAR-TO-DATE REVENUE & EXPENSES



Year-to-date operating revenues are \$484,587 above budget while operating expenses are \$3,738,794 under budget.

MANAGING DIRECTOR'S NOTES

As of the time that I am writing these notes, the Legislature and the Governor have not agreed on a budget or stop-gap budget for the coming year. We are being told that if that does not occur before July 1, 2017 then IDOT will be shut down and all road projects being processed by IDOT must stop. That, of course, means that MCORE will stop construction on July 1.

If this truly occurs, then Green Street within Project 2 will be opened to two-way traffic from Neil Street to Wright Street. However, within Project 1, Green Street will remain closed during IDOT's shutdown. The contractor may attempt to open a portion of Green Street between Mathews Street and Goodwin Street, but only if it's possible to do so safely. Otherwise it will remain completely closed from Wright Street to Goodwin Street.

This is obviously a very unfortunate situation. It potentially jeapordizes the Federal TIGER funds because of the mandatory completion timeline associated with the TIGER grant. And the crazy thing is, there aren't any State dollars in the project - it's all Federal and Local money. But the State might shut it down and cost us the Federal money.

The proposed cuts in the current version of the Senate budget being discussed have disastrous cuts for Downstate Transit in it. The legislators that have proposed the cuts indicate that they are a 10% cut, which would be difficult for us - but we could survive. What they seem to be unwilling to listen to is that a 10% cut in State funding has a 35% cut in terms of total impact to the District. This would result in nearly catastrophic cuts in levels of service and many layoffs.

BOARD PRIORITIES

Customer Service

ISO 9001:2015/ISO 14001:2015 - The ESMS Team presented the quarterly Management Review to senior management in June. The group discussed strategies for sharing information with Board Members, progress on environmental objectives, and the Management System Policy which will be presented for Board approval during this meeting.

Development Efforts

Illinois Terminal Expansion – The key stakeholder partners are formulating a plan to begin disseminating information via a variety of press releases. These could start in the very near future.

Downtown Urbana Transit Facility – Conversations have continued with property owners of potential sites and project partners to evaluate viability.

Route Analysis

Though we have not received the contract from IDOT yet, they have informally told us that the grant has been approved. We proactively sent the RFP to their office for pre-bid concurrence so we are awaiting 1) the contract and 2) pre-bid concurrence.

Staff continues to work on a number of projects including:

- MCORE While construction progresses on Projects 1, 2, & 3; design work has begun for Projects 4, 5, & 6.
- U of I contract negotiation discussions with U of I staff continue.
- Service development for YMCA, Carle at the Fields, and SW Champaign.





- A. Introduction The District received an annexation petition request from Carle Foundation to annex their properties out by the Curtis Road interchange off of I-57. The area is commonly referred to as Carle at the Fields.
- **B.** Recommended Action: As the annexation of this area allows the District to comply with its Annexation Agreement with the City of Champaign, staff recommends approval.
- **C. Prior Trustee Action:** From time-to-time, the District will follow-through with annexations to comply with annexation agreements that are in effect with the Cities of Champaign and Urbana & the Village of Savoy. This is consistent with the Board's Policy #1, Regional Roles and Partnerships; the Board's Policy #2, Service Planning Area; the annexation agreements; and the Goals and Objectives of the Regional Planning Commission/Champaign-Urbana Urbanized Area Transportation Study's Long Range Transportation Plan.
- **D.** Summary: Staff is planning on launching service to this area in January or February of 2018 (whenever Carle is moved into their new facilities). The timing of this annexation coincides with that service.



- A. Introduction As the District received an annexation petition request from Carle Foundation to annex their properties out by the Curtis Road interchange off of I-57 and began planning new service to that area, it became obvious that the remainder of southwest Champaign that is eligible for annexation and service should be annexed as well. This will allow the District to plan comprehensively for improved service to the entire southwest Champaign region.
- **B.** Recommended Action: As the annexation of this area allows the District to comply with its Annexation Agreement with the City of Champaign, staff recommends approval.
- **C. Prior Trustee Action:** From time-to-time, the District will follow-through with annexations to comply with annexation agreements that are in effect with the Cities of Champaign and Urbana & the Village of Savoy. This is consistent with the Board's Policy #1, Regional Roles and Partnerships; the Board's Policy #2, Service Planning Area; the annexation agreements; and the Goals and Objectives of the Regional Planning Commission/Champaign-Urbana Urbanized Area Transportation Study's Long Range Transportation Plan.
- **D. Summary:** Staff is planning on launching service to this area in January or February of 2018 (whenever Carle is moved into their new facilities). However, the area would be eligible for ADA and Half-Fare Cab service immediately upon annexation. The Planners will reach out to residents and homeowners associations for input regarding the new service levels and types of service.





REAL ESTATE PURCHASE AND SALE AGREEMENT

THIS REAL ESTATE PURCHASE AND SALE AGREEMENT (the "Contract") is made effective and entered into as of this 22nd day of June, 2017 (the "Effective Date") by and between Champaign-Urbana Mass Transit District ("Seller") and

The Seller shall deposit such certified or cashier's check into an escrow account (the "Escrow") to be established with Escrow Agent by the Seller and Purchaser pursuant to the terms of this Contract. The Escrow shall be maintained at the Escrow Agent's offices at 301 North Neil, Suite 304, Champaign, IL 61820.

3.1 The Initial Deposit must be increased on or before 10:00 a.m. CDT, June 30, 2017 by a deposit (the "Supplemental Deposit") into the Escrow payable in U.S. dollars by wire transfer of funds, certified or cashier's check, in an amount which, when added to the Initial Deposit, shall equal the sum of ten percent (10%) of the Purchase Price. If the Purchaser does not timely make the Supplemental Deposit, the Initial Deposit shall be forfeited to the Seller. The Initial Deposit, together with the Second Deposit, is hereinafter referred to as the "Earnest Money Deposit". Purchaser acknowledges that the Earnest Money Deposit is non-refundable to Purchaser except as otherwise specifically set forth in this Contract.

4. <u>TITLE STATUS</u>

4.1 The Seller has delivered to Purchaser an ALTA Owner's Commitment of Title Insurance, Commitment No. 5253 - 1701329 with an effective date of April 28, 2017, issued by, Chicago Title Insurance Company covering the Real Property (the "Title Commitment"), pursuant to which the Title Company agrees, subject to the provisions thereof, to issue to Purchaser an ALTA Owner's Policy of Title Insurance (the "Owner's Policy").

4.2 The Schedule B exceptions in the Title Commitment, as well as any matters shown on the Survey (as defined herein) are hereinafter referred to as the "Permitted Exceptions". Seller warrants to Purchaser that the following Schedule B exceptions in the Title Commitment will be deleted in the final Owner's Policy: General Exceptions 1-5 and Exceptions 6, 7, 9 and 11-14 and any Permitted Exceptions, solely to the extent that the Title Company agrees, based on the Survey evidence that such Permitted Exceptions do not encumber The Real Property. Purchaser has reviewed the Title Commitment and by execution of this Contract hereby waives any and all objections to any and all matters disclosed by the Title Commitment.

4.3 If at the time of closing the Title Company is not able to issue the Owner's Policy because of a defect in, or encumbrance on title to the Real Property which is not included in the Permitted Exceptions, and Purchaser objects to such title defect or encumbrance in writing within three (3) business days of receipt of notification of defect, then the Seller may delay the closing for a period not to exceed thirty days, for purposes of clearing such defect or encumbrance from the title to the Real Property or procuring title insurance over such defect or encumbrance. If the Seller notifies Purchaser in writing that such title defects cannot be deleted or insured over by the Title Company at a cost to Seller of less than \$5,000, then at the option of either the Seller or the Purchaser upon written notice to the other, this Contract may be terminated and the parties shall have no further obligations hereunder and the Earnest Money Deposit shall be returned to Purchaser; provided, however, if no such notice of termination of the Contract is given by either party hereto within three (3) business days after Seller's notice to Purchaser that such title defects cannot be deleted or insured over the Title Company, then those title defects shall also be deemed additional Permitted Exceptions, and the parties shall proceed in the closing of this sale.

5. <u>SURVEY</u>

5.1 The Seller has provided a Boundary Survey of the Real Property prepared by MSA Professional Services, Inc., dated June _____th, 2017 (the "Survey"). By execution of this Contract, Purchaser hereby approves the Survey in its entirety and agrees to accept title to the Real Property subject to the Permitted Exceptions and any and all matters revealed by the Survey.

6. **INSPECTION AND EXAMINATION**

6.1 (a) Purchaser acknowledges that Purchaser and Purchaser's authorized agents and representatives, if any, have been entitled to enter the Real Property for the purpose of inspecting and examining the Property. Purchaser does not and will not rely upon any statement, representation or documentation as to the condition of the Property made or provided by the Seller, Auctioneer, their successors and their respective officers, directors, shareholders, employees, agents, partners, members, consultants, contractors, attorneys and servants (collectively the "Seller Parties"). The provisions of this Section shall survive closing or any termination of this Contract.

(b) By execution of the Contract, Purchaser acknowledges (and shall be deemed to have accepted) that the Property is being sold and conveyed by the Seller to Purchaser "AS IS, WHERE IS, WITH ALL FAULTS", as the same may be on the Closing Date, and without any covenants, representations or warranties of any kind, express or implied from or by anyone, including without limitation from or by any of the Seller Parties, as to any conditions of the Property, including, without limitation, surface and subsurface conditions, whether latent or patent. The Seller Parties make no guarantee, warranty or representation, express or implied, as to the quality, character, or condition of the Property (or any part thereof) or the fitness of the Property (or any part thereof) for any use or purpose or any representation as to the nonexistence of any Hazardous Substances (as defined herein). Purchaser shall have no claim against any of the Seller Parties at law or in equity based upon the condition of the Property or the failure of the Property to meet or comply with any standards, laws, regulations or other governmental requirements. In no event shall any of the Seller Parties be liable for incidental, special, exemplary or consequential damages, including, without limitation, loss of profits or revenue, interference with business operations, loss of tenants, lenders, investors, buyers, diminution in value of the Property, or inability to use the Property, due to the condition of the Property. Purchaser covenants, represents and warrants to the Seller that Purchaser has had ample opportunity to make a proper inspection, examination and investigation of the Property and all documents relating thereto to familiarize itself with the condition of the Property and that Purchaser has done so to Purchaser's satisfaction. Purchaser agrees that Purchaser: (1) shall purchase and accept title to the Real Property subject to any and all conditions including, without limitation, environmental conditions relating thereto; (2) shall not have relied on any covenant, representation or warranty made by or on behalf of any of the Seller Parties with respect to the environmental conditions of the Real Property, including without limitation any and all surface and subsurface environmental conditions; and (3) shall fully assume all obligations and liabilities in any way relating to the Real Property to any third party or to any governmental entity. In the event any Hazardous Substances are discovered on, at or under the Real Property, Purchaser shall not maintain, and hereby waives on behalf of itself and its successors and assigns, any right to maintain, any action or assert any claim against any of the Seller Parties arising out of or relating to any Hazardous Substance including, without limitation, any action or claim for contribution or for the generation, use, handling, treatment, removal, storage, decontamination, cleanup, transport or disposal thereof. "Hazardous Substances" include any pollutants, dangerous substances, toxic substances, hazardous wastes, hazardous materials, or hazardous substances as defined in or pursuant to the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (42 U.S.C.§§ 6901 et seq.), as amended, the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act (42 U.S.C. §§ 9601, et seq.), as amended, or any other federal, state or local environmental law, ordinance, rule or regulation, and petroleum or petroleum-containing products,

asbestos-containing material, lead-based paint, urea formaldehyde, and radon gas. The provisions of this Section shall survive Closing or any termination of this Contract.

6.2 Purchaser acknowledges that Auctioneer has provided to Purchaser prior to or at the Auction in the bidder package delivered by the Auctioneer (the "Bidder Package"), the following items:

(a) real estate tax Information;

- (b) the Plat Map;
- (c) the Title Commitment
- (d) TIF, zoning, demographics, traffic count information
- (e) the Contract
- (f) the Survey and
- (g) the real estate tax bills
- 6.3 Intentionally omitted.

6.4 The Seller Parties represent that all documents and information provided to Purchaser, including without limitation, the Bidder Package, have been obtained by the Seller Parties from sources deemed to be reliable. However, neither the Seller Parties, nor their successors and their respective officers, directors, shareholders, employees, agents, partners, members, consultants, contractors, attorneys and servants, makes any representations or warranties and hereby disclaim any and all alleged representations and warranties, as to the accuracy, authenticity, adequacy or completeness of any document or information contained in the Bidder Package or otherwise provided to Purchaser by any of the Seller Parties in connection with the Property.

7. <u>CLOSING</u>

7.1 The date of closing (the "Closing Date") shall be, and the event of closing (the "Closing") shall occur in escrow at the offices of the Escrow Agent on or before August 4, 2017, at such hour as the Seller and Purchaser may mutually agree, but otherwise at 11:00 a.m. CDT. In the event that the Purchase Price and all other sums due and owing from Purchaser to the Seller hereunder have not been paid in full to the Escrow Agent by 2:00 p.m. CDT on the Closing Date, Purchaser shall pay the Seller interest on such funds at the rate of ten percent (10%) per annum each day until the date such funds are received by the Escrow Agent, provided that if such funds, including interest, are not received by the Escrow Agent within one (1) business day after the Closing Date, then the Seller may, at Seller's election, terminate the Contract due to Purchaser's default. Upon such termination due to Purchaser's default, Seller shall have those remedies provided in Section 10.1 hereof. If any portion of the Purchase Price is paid by means of wire transfer, upon putting the funds on the wire, Purchaser shall cause the Escrow Agent to be notified of such fact together with the identity of the financial institution initiating the wire transaction and of the wire confirmation number. If the Closing has not occurred by the Closing Date other than by reason of Purchaser's default or any other permitted reason expressly provided for herein, then this Contract shall terminate and the Earnest Money Deposit shall be returned to Purchaser, who shall then have those remedies specified in Section 10.2 hereof. Purchaser

acknowledges that this sale is not contingent on Purchaser obtaining financing and that the failure of Purchaser to obtain such financing will not relieve Purchaser of its obligations hereunder. For avoidance of doubt, Purchaser's failure to close due to its inability to obtain financing shall be a default by Purchaser.

7.2 In addition to the Purchase Price, Purchaser shall pay all recordation fees (except for those fees charged for the release of any existing mortgages), title examination fees and premiums for the issuance of the Owner's and any Lender's Policy, all transfer taxes, if any, including without limitation, Champaign County, State of Illinois, and any applicable municipal transfer taxes. Seller and Purchaser will each pay one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) of the closing escrow or closing fee or charge imposed by the Escrow Agent. Each party shall be responsible for paying its own legal fees incurred in connection with this transaction.

7.3 The agreements set forth in this Section 7.3 shall survive the Closing:

(a) All utilities shall be transferred upon Closing, and the Seller shall cause final readings to be made as near to the date of Closing as is reasonably possible. Purchaser shall pay all utility charges which accrue after the Closing Date.

(b) Current real estate taxes shall be prorated between the Seller and Purchaser as of the Closing Date based upon 100% of the 2016 tax bill or, if not issued, the last ascertainable tax bill. Real Property tax assessment reductions, tax refunds and credits received by Purchaser, if any, shall be prorated between Seller and Purchaser based on the number of days each party owned the Real Property during the period covered by the reductions, refunds, and credits, after deducting the expenses of collection thereof (including customary attorney's fees), which obligation to prorate any such reduction refunds and credits shall expressly survive the Closing.

(c) All other amounts paid or payable by Seller for goods and/or services in connection with the ownership and/or operation of the Real Property shall be prorated at Closing. Such prorations shall be calculated based on invoices, paid receipts, cancelled checks or other evidence of (i) the amounts paid and/or payable by the Seller and (ii) the term for which such payment(s) apply.

7.4 Prior to Closing, the Seller shall deliver to Escrow Agent the following documents which shall be duly executed and, where appropriate, acknowledged, together with any and all items or instruments necessary or appropriate thereto:

- (a) A special warranty deed from the Seller in the form of <u>Exhibit B</u> attached hereto and incorporated herein, sufficient to convey to the Purchaser or Purchaser's assignee title to said Real Property subject to the Permitted Exceptions;
- (b) an Affidavit required pursuant to Section 1445 of the Internal Revenue Code stating that the Seller is not a foreign entity within the meaning of Section 1445 of The Internal Revenue Code;
- (c) the Owner's Policy (at Purchaser's expense) in the amount of the Purchase Price;
- (d) State, County, and local real estate transfer tax declarations prepared for Purchaser's signature;

- (e) a signed closing statement setting forth the Purchase Price and all debits and credits to Purchaser and the Seller in connection with this sale (the "Closing Statement");
- (f) Seller's authority documents sufficient to cause the Title Company to issue the Owner's Policy and
- (g) the Survey, revised to add the names of the Purchaser, any lender specified by Purchaser, and the Title Company as parties to whom the Surveyor's certificate is made;

7.5 Prior to Closing, Purchaser shall deliver to the Escrow Agent the following:

(a) the Purchase Price less the Earnest Money Deposit, plus or minus credits due for prorations, plus any amounts for closing costs to be paid by Purchaser;

(b) a signed counterpart of the Closing Statement;

(c) to the extent necessary or applicable, Purchaser's Partnership Agreement, Certificate of Limited Partnership, Declaration of Trust, Certificate of Existence, Articles of Organization, Operating Agreement, and/or Articles of Incorporation certified by the appropriate Secretary of State; By-Laws certified by a corporate secretary, if applicable; Corporate Resolutions certified by a corporate secretary or Consents of Partners, Members or Trustees authorizing purchase of the Property; Certificate of Incumbency or other evidence of authority of officer, general partner, member, trustee or individual(s) signing on behalf of Purchaser; Certificate of Good Standing from the Secretary of the State of Illinois and of the state of incorporation or formation, and such other evidence of the authority of Purchaser and of the person(s) executing documents on behalf of Purchaser to purchase the Property as may be required by the Seller and/or Escrow Agent and any other documents reasonably required by Escrow Agent to complete the sale of the Property contemplated by this Contract, all such documents to be in a form satisfactory to the Seller and Escrow Agent;

(d) a signed counterpart to the State, County and local real estate transfer tax declaration;

(e) any other documents or materials reasonably requested by Seller or Escrow Agent to consummate the transaction contemplated in this Contract.

7.6 Possession of the Property shall be delivered to Purchaser at Closing.

8. NO SELLER REPRESENTATIONS OR WARRANTIES; LIMITED SELLER COVENANTS

8.1 The Seller Parties have not made and shall not be deemed to have made any warranty or representation, expressed or implied, written or oral, concerning the Property or any uses to which the Property may or may not be put including, without limitation, the following:

(a) The nature, physical condition, zoning or other aspect of the Real Property;

(b) the income or expenses generated, paid or incurred in connection with the Real Property;

(c) the accuracy of any statements, calculations, conditions or dimensions stated or set forth in the items provided by the Seller or by any third party concerning the Real Property, including, without limitation, the Bidder Package; or,

(d) the existence of Hazardous Substances in, on, about, under, or affecting the Real Property.

8.2 The Seller makes the following covenants to Purchaser:

(a) from and after the Effective Date, the Seller will not sell, assign or create, any right, title or interest in or to the Property or create, or knowingly do anything to cause any lien, encumbrance or charge thereon, other than those expressly permitted hereby, without discharging same prior to Closing;

(b) between the Effective Date and the Closing Date, the Seller will advise Purchaser if the Seller receives written notification of any pending or threatened litigation or other legal action affecting the Property.

(c) from and after the Effective Date, the Seller will not enter into any new agreements affecting the Property, except those terminable upon the earlier of the Closing Date or thirty (30) or fewer days' notice.

9. PURCHASER'S REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES

9.1 Purchaser represents and warrants to the Seller the following:

(a) Purchaser is a ______ duly organized, validly existing and in good standing under the laws of the State of ______, and has the full corporate power and authority to conduct business in the State of Illinois.

(b) The proposed assignee of Purchaser, if any, as set forth in Section 15.8 hereof, if any, is a ______ duly organized, validly existing and in good standing under the laws of the State of ______.

(c) Purchaser and the proposed assignee of Purchaser, as set forth in Section 15.8 hereof, have full power and authority to execute this Contract (or the assignment of this Contract, as the case may be) and perform all of the obligations required hereunder (and thereunder).

10. <u>DEFAULT</u>

10.1 In the event that Purchaser shall fail to purchase the Property in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Contract, or otherwise defaults in the performance of Purchaser's obligations hereunder for any reason, the Seller shall be paid and shall retain the Earnest Money Deposit as liquidated damages and as the Seller's sole and exclusive remedy hereunder. Such remedy shall also be available to Seller upon Seller's termination of the Contract as provided in Section 7.1. The Seller and Purchaser agree that the Earnest Money Deposit represents the Seller and Purchaser's best estimate of the Seller's damages in the event of a default by Purchaser, which actual damages each recognizes would be difficult to ascertain.

10.2 If this Contract is terminated other than as a result of a default by Purchaser, the Earnest Money Deposit shall be returned to Purchaser and, to the extent that the Seller has defaulted on the Seller's obligations hereunder, Purchaser shall be entitled to specific performance of this Contract; provided, however, that in no event shall the Seller be liable to Purchaser for money damages as a result of any breach or default by the Seller including, without limitation, of any warranty, representation, obligation, or other duty of the Seller provided for herein.

11. MANAGING BROKER FEES AND COMMISSIONS

11.1 Seller and Purchaser represent each to the other that each has had no dealings with any managing broker, finder or other party concerning Purchaser's purchase of the Premises except ("Buyer's Agent"), who has qualified as a Buyer's Auctioneer and Agent under the terms of the Bidder Package. The Seller has agreed to pay certain fees and commissions to Auctioneer at Closing pursuant to the Auction Agreement. Pursuant to the terms of the Auction, as the successful bidder, Purchaser has agreed to pay an amount equal to ten percent (10%) of the high bid price (the "Buyer's Premium"). Purchaser acknowledges that Auctioneer represents the Seller as its exclusive agent. A commission equal to two percent (2%) of the high bid price (exclusive of the Buyer's Premium) will be paid to any real estate managing broker who qualifies as a Buyer's Agent under the terms of the Bidder Package. Purchaser shall pay all other real estate brokerage commissions, if any, due as a result of this Contract and this sale. Purchaser hereby agrees to indemnify and hold the Seller Parties harmless from all loss, cost, damage or expense (including, without limitation, reasonable attorney's fees) incurred by any of them as a result of any claim arising out of the acts of the indemnifying party (or others on the indemnifying party's behalf) for a commission, finder's fee or similar compensation made by any managing broker, broker, finder or any party (other than Auctioneer and Buyer's Agent) who claims to have dealt with Purchaser.

12. NOTICE

12.1 Any notice required or permitted to be delivered hereunder shall be deemed to have been given and received upon the earlier to occur of: (i) actual receipt by the addressee thereof; (ii) three (3) days after deposit in the United States mail, postage prepaid, registered or certified mail, return receipt requested; (iii) on the business date of dispatch by facsimile with electronic confirmation; or (iv) one (1) business day after with deposit by Federal Express or other comparable overnight commercial courier, postage prepaid, in each case addressed to the Seller or Purchaser, as the case may be, as follows:

13. EXCHANGE(S) UNDER INTERNAL REVENUE CODE SECTION 1031:

13.1 Purchaser shall, in good faith, fully and completely cooperate with the Seller to the extent of and/or to enable Seller to accomplish one (1) or more like-kind exchange(s) under and pursuant to Internal Revenue Code Section 1031. Upon Seller's request(s) at any time(s) on or before Closing, Purchaser will also execute and deliver to Seller an acknowledgement of the assignment of this Contract to such Seller's qualified Section 1031 intermediary and/or such additional documents as may be requested by Seller. Purchaser shall not, in any event, be required or obligated to incur or pay any additional costs/expenses resulting from or relating to any of Sellers' exchange transaction(s). Seller shall likewise in good faith fully cooperate and assist Purchaser if Purchaser is acquiring the Property pursuant to this Contract as part of any Internal Revenue Code Section 1031 Exchange; provided, however, that Seller shall not incur or be obligated to incur any additional or further cost/expense associated therewith or relating thereto. Provided, further, however, that the failure to close because of the inability to complete a Section 1031 Exchange by the Closing Date shall be a Purchaser default.

14. IRREVOCABLE OFFER

Purchaser acknowledges that the Purchaser has read and understands the terms and conditions of purchase as set forth in this Contract, agrees to purchase the Property at, for and upon the terms of this Contract and for the stipulated price and agrees that Purchaser's execution and delivery of this Contract shall constitute an irrevocable offer to purchase made to Seller.

Purchaser hereby agrees that this offer shall remain irrevocable until 5:00 p.m. CDT, on Monday, June 26, 2017. Notice from the Seller or Auctioneer or other duly authorized agent to accept or reject Purchaser's offer under this provision may be given pursuant to the notice provision in the Contract or by telephone and confirmed at a later date by letter or mailgram. Failure of Seller or Auctioneer or other duly authorized agent to notify Purchaser on a timely basis shall not constitute acceptance or rejection by Seller of Purchaser's offer, but after 5:00 p.m. CDT, on Monday, June 26, 2017, Purchaser's offer shall thereafter become revocable by Purchaser.

15. MISCELLANEOUS

15.1 This Contract and all of the terms, provisions and covenants contained herein shall apply to, be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the parties hereto, their respective successors and assigns.

15.2 The captions employed in this Contract are for convenience only and are not intended in any way to limit or amplify the terms and provisions of this Contract.

15.3 Time is of the essence of this Contract.

15.4 This Contract shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Illinois, and venue for any cause of action arising hereunder shall lie in Champaign County, Illinois.

15.5 This Contract embodies and constitutes the entire understanding among the parties with respect to the transactions contemplated herein, and all prior or contemporaneous agreements, understandings. Representations and statements, oral or written, are merged into this Contract. Neither this Contract nor any provision hereof may be waived, modified or amended, except by an instrument in writing signed by the party against which the enforcement of such waiver, modification or amendment is sought and then only to the extent set forth in such instrument.

15.6 This Contract may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall constitute an original and all which taken together shall constitute an original and all which taken together shall constitute a single agreement.

15.7 If a date of significance hereunder falls upon a Saturday, Sunday or legal holiday such date will be deemed moved forward to the next day which is not a Saturday, Sunday or legal holiday. The terms "working day" or "business day" shall mean days elapsed exclusive of Saturdays, Sundays or legal holidays for federally insured United States chartered banks.

15.8 This Contract may be assigned by Purchaser only with the written consent of the Seller, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld, and said assignee of Purchaser must assume in writing the obligations of Purchaser under this Contract and agree to be bound by the terms hereof. Following such assignment, Purchaser shall continue to remain liable hereunder. Such assignment shall not be effective until Purchaser has delivered to the Seller a fully executed assignment agreement in form and substance satisfactory to the Seller whereby the assignee assumes all of Purchaser's obligations under this Contract.

15.9 Neither this Contract nor a memorandum hereof shall be recorded by or on behalf of the Seller, Purchaser or anyone else.

15.10 Whenever the context hereof shall so require, the singular shall include the plural, the male gender shall include the female gender and the neuter, and vice versa.

15.11 Except as herein expressly otherwise provided, no agreement, representation or warranty herein contained shall survive the Closing and, except as herein expressly otherwise provided, all such agreements, representations and warranties shall be merged in such Closing. Purchaser agrees to accept the Property "AS IS, WHERE IS, WITH ALL FAULTS" in its condition as of the Closing and acknowledges and agrees that NONE OF THE SELLER PARTIES HAS MADE AND DOES NOT HEREBY MAKE ANY REPRESENTATIONS, WARRANTIES, OR COVENANTS OF ANY KIND OR CHARACTER WHATSOEVER WITH RESPECT TO THE PROPERTY, WHETHER EXPRESS OR IMPLIED. FURTHERMORE, WITHOUT LIMITING THE GENERALITY OF THE FOREGOING, PURCHASER ACKNOWLEDGES AND AGREES THAT NONE OF THE SELLER PARTIES HAS MADE AND DOES NOT MAKE, AND PURCHASER HEREBY DISCLAIMS THE EXISTENCE OF OR RELIANCE UPON, ANY IMPLIED WARRANTY, INCLUDING ANY IMPLIED WARRANTY OF

MERCHANTABILITY OR FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR USE. Purchaser hereby represents that Purchaser is not relying upon any warranties, promises, guarantees, or representations made by the Seller Parties or anyone acting or claiming to act on behalf of any of the Seller Parties in purchasing the Property, other than the warranties expressly set out in the Deed and this Contract, if any.

15.12 If any provision of this Contract shall for any reason be held to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect, such provision shall be severable from the remaining provisions of this Contract, and the validity, legality and enforceability of the remaining provisions shall not in any way be affected or impaired thereby.



- A. Introduction The purpose of the Management System Policy is to define the quality and environmental commitments of the District and provide guidance for the development, management, and maintenance of the Management System. The Policy is responsive to element 5.2 of the ISO 9001:2015 and ISO 14001:2015 Standards. The Policy applies to all District employees and those working on behalf of the District.
- **B. Recommended Action**: Staff recommends approval of the Management System Policy by the Board of Trustees and the Managing Director.

C. Prior Trustee Action

- On March 30, 2011, the original version of the Environmental Policy was approved by the Board of Trustees and the Managing Director.
- On April 24, 2013, the Environmental Policy Revision 1.1 was approved by the Board of Trustees and the Managing Director. No changes were made from the original Policy other than updating the Chair of the Board of Trustees.
- On March 25, 2015, the Environmental Policy Revision 1.2 was approved by the Board of Trustees and the Managing Director. No major changes were made.
- **D. Summary:** The Management System Policy describes the District's commitment to implementing and continually improving management practices to promote high quality and environmentally sustainable transportation options to the community. The Policy provides the framework for setting and reviewing quality and environmental objectives. Training on the Policy is included as part of the new hire employee orientation-training program. The Policy is posted throughout all three facilities and is available on the employee intranet as well as the District's public website.
- **E. Background:** Since approval of the original version in 2011, the Environmental Policy has been reviewed by the ESMS Team and approved by the Managing Director and the Board of Trustees every two years. The review helps ensure the Policy is current and reflects any changes in activities, products, services, technological options, legal and other obligations, and the ISO Standard.

The District is actively developing a Quality Management System, which is being aligned with the Environmental Management system to form one integrated Management System. Thus, staff have replaced the Environmental Policy with a Management System Policy, to incorporate both environmental and quality guidelines.

F. Alternatives – advantages/disadvantages

- 1. Approve the Management System Policy. This approval represents Senior Management's endorsement and commitment to promote and adhere to the Policy.
- 2. Do not approve the Management System Policy. An ISO 14001 auditor will visit our site in September 2017 and request evidence of a biennial review and Senior Management endorsement of the Policy.

- **G. Community Input:** Comments, inquiries, and suggestions submitted to the District by external stakeholders, voluntarily, or through consultation, are considered when reviewing the Management System Policy. No relevant communications was received for this revision. The Management System Policy is communicated to the public via the District's website.
- H. Budget & Staffing Impacts: None.
