### **MINUTES**

#### 1. Call to Order

Acting Chair Chaplan called the meeting to order at 3:02 p.m.

A verbal roll call was taken, and a quorum was declared present.

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### 3. Approval of Agenda

**MOTION** by Mr. Hannon to approve the agenda as distributed; seconded by Ms. Bauer. Upon vote, the **MOTION CARRIED** unanimously.

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### 4. Audience Participation

Mr. Simmons asked if benches and/or shelters could be expected for the Round Barn Road transfer area. Mr. Gnadt indicated that he is talking with the City of Champaign to see what amenities could fit in the

 limited space. Mr. Simmons was also interested in the funding for the proposed Illinois Terminal Expansion project.

#### Eric Wirth

Mr. Wirth was concerned about the distance that people with disabilities may have to walk to the bus stop from Gramercy Park Apartments in Champaign.

### 5. Approval of Minutes

A. Board Meeting – June 28, 2017

**MOTION** by Mr. Hannon to approve the minutes of the June 28, 2017 CUMTD Board meeting as distributed; seconded by Mr. Cho. Upon vote, the **MOTION CARRIED**. Ms. Bauer abstained as she did not attend the meeting.

### 7. Reports

#### A. Managing Director

Mr. Gnadt reviewed the District's ridership and financial numbers for June 2017. The drop in FY2017 monthly revenue for June was skewed due to an adjustment by the University for additional student fees paid in FY2016. The State of Illinois now has a budget. Concerning transit, the budget implementation bill included a 10% cut to the Downstate Public Transportation Fund which may underfund the account. On a positive note, transit money will be directly deposited into the Downstate Public Transportation Fund, bypassing the Comptroller's office, beginning 7/1/2017. This should get the quarterly operating payments disbursed to the District on a timely basis again. Staff is working with Token Transit to test an aspect of their mobile app-based fare system that will identify trip origin and destination points.

#### B. Board Committees

- 1) Administration No report
- 2) Facilities Hans Grotelueschen of Prairieview Park LLC and Mr. Gnadt discussed the proposed Illinois Terminal Expansion project in downtown Champaign. The preliminary design includes an event center (Hockey Arena) that will be dependent on University of Illinois Department of Intercollegiate Athletics' support. The project will utilize tax increment financing (TIF), so there is no plan for new taxes on residents.
- 3) **Service Delivery** No report

#### 8. Action Items

#### A. Authorize Execution of Downstate Operating Assistance Grant Agreement

Mr. Gnadt stated that this resolution is presented annually to the Board for the State Grant Operating Assistance Program – a reimbursement for 65% of operating expenses.

**MOTION** by Ms. Bauer to authorize the Managing Director to execute the Downstate Operating Assistance Grant agreement; seconded by Mr. Hannon. Upon vote, the **MOTION CARRIED** unanimously.

### B. <u>CUMTD Facilities and District Vehicles Rules and Regulations of Conduct</u>

Since 1999, this policy has been in effect concerning facilities. It was adapted to a systemwide approach to include both District vehicles and facilities. Exclusion decisions are made on very rare occurrences where the person is endangering the safety of other passengers or District staff. Mr. Alyx Parker, attorney for the District, indicated that this policy will adequately protect the due process rights of the public.

**MOTION** by Mr. Hannon to approve Champaign-Urbana Mass Transit District Facilities and District Vehicles Rules and Regulations of Conduct in concept; seconded by Ms. Bauer. Upon vote, the **MOTION CARRIED** unanimously.

After review for minor language changes, this policy will be accessible on CUMTD's website.

### C. <u>Semi-Annual Review of Closed Session Minutes</u>

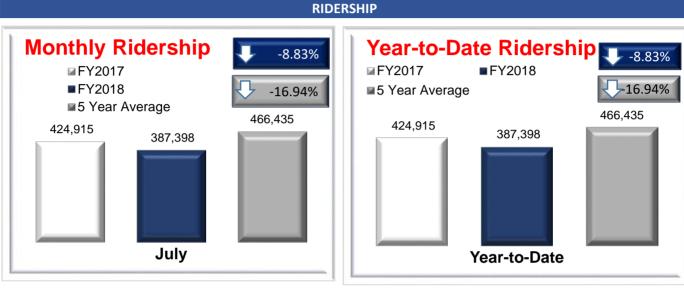

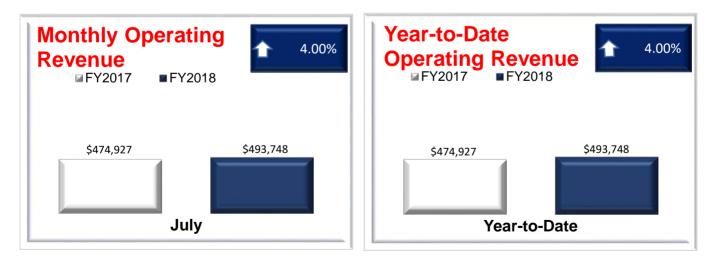
### MTD MANAGING DIRECTOR OPERATING NOTES

August, 2017



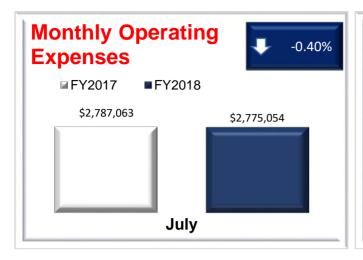

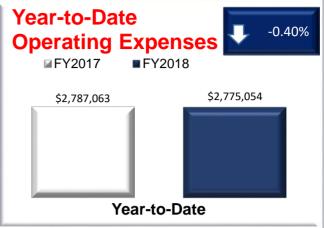
### **OPERATING REVENUE**

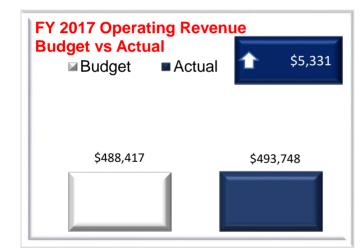
### **OPERATING EXPENSES**

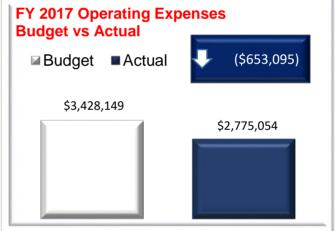

### **MANAGING DIRECTOR'S NOTES**

On August 22, Hans Grotelueschen, City of Champaign staff, and I met with the Champaign City Council regarding the Illinois Terminal Expansion (ITE) project. We were seeking approval to move forward with due diligence action steps like negotiating an Intergovernmental Agreement with the City, a Joint Development Agreement with the developer, and hiring a variety of consultants to conduct studies (Parking Analysis, Traffic Analysis, Market Demand & Economic Impact Analysis, etc). The Council unanimously approved that City staff begin taking these steps. MTD, the City, and Hans will immediately launch into these components to complete as soon as possible.

MTD has submitted a grant application to the Federal Transit Administration's (FTA) Bus & Bus Facilities 5339 program for joint development funding of the ITE project. Joint development dollars offer some additional flexibility in regards to the scope of spending. For instance, FTA's grants can, of course, be used for transit portions of the construction, but the joint development program allows the Federal money to be spent on some non-transportation components - as long as revenue is captured from the project to pay back the value of the grant funds to MTD. We should hear back on this grant sometime in this Fall.

Staff is evaluating a contract with Token Transit for mobile ticketing. This system is an app-based product that will allow our riders to purchase fares in a variety of denominations and then show a pass on their mobile phone to our operator. This offers a great deal of convenience and flexibility for our customers. Token Transit also has a new method of anonymously tracking origin and destinations of their users and we will be their pilot customer for this module. This is very exciting as this is something we've been working toward for more than a year now.

We are also pursuing another software vendor called Tap Ride. This will initially allow University students who utilize SafeRides to schedule their trips using an app similar to Lyft. We believe this is a great step forward in making SafeRides more user-friendly for the students and more efficient for us. The cost of the licenses will be borne by the contract with the University of Illinois.

The closing on 64 E. Chester (Bush Bros. building) took place August 24, 2017. This is the building that Scott Cochrane won the bid on during the public auction.

The ISO 14001:2015 certification audit will be occurring September 11 - 15. This will bring our Environmental & Sustainability Management System in compliance with the most recent standard.

Staff has worked VERY hard this past Summer getting ready for the launch of the full service year. Designated Stops, in particular, were a challenge. But maintenance and operations were successful in meeting deadlines for the beginning of the new year. Some cleanup and tweaking will continue to occur over the next several weeks. Staff also spent a lot of time manning booths at Taste of Champaign, Sweetcorn Festival, and Quad Day.

#### **MAJOR EFFORTS**

#### **Development Efforts**

Illinois Terminal Expansion – As mentioned above, the project will move directly into a due diligence phase.

Downtown Urbana Transit Facility – Productive conversations have continued with property owners of potential sites and project partners to evaluate viability. We are tentatively evaluating the potential of hiring an architect to render a conceptual drawing of the project.

## **Route Analysis**

We continue to wait for the grant contract from IDOT.

## **ONGOING PROJECTS**

Staff continues to work on a number of projects including:

- MCORE Construction progresses on Projects 1, 2, & 3 and despite the State shutdown in early July, the contractor is only slightly behind schedule. Design work continues for Projects 4, 5, & 6.
- U of I contract negotiation discussions with U of I staff continue.
- Service development for YMCA, Carle at the Fields, and SW Champaign.

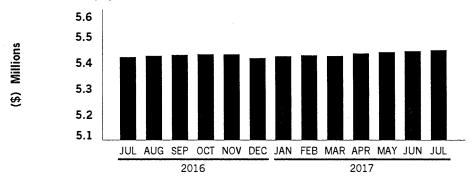

The below chart displays the most recent thirteen months of Market Value.

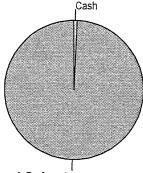

Subject: Ethics – A Proposed Course of Action

**A. Introduction:** This report discusses ethics in local government and suggests a course of action for the Board's consideration.

**B.** Recommended Action: The administration requests the Board to provide direction with respect to future Board meetings involving the presentation of topics including conflicts of interest, open meetings, and freedom of information and Board discussion surrounding those topics.

#### C. Summary:

- The MTD is a leader in mass transit.
- Ethical behavior by elected and appointed officials is a focus of public attention.
- Discussion is proposed to take place at several upcoming meetings and cover open meetings, freedom of
  information, integrity and communication with the public concerning the MTD's ethical standards. The
  discussion will include discussion of the impact of technology.
- Board discussion of ethics will promote positive public perception and set a strong tone for the organization.
- Local government officials encounter many challenges in the course of representing the public.

#### D. Background:

1. Why Talk about Ethics Now? The time to deal with ethics is all the time. State, local and national news reports are replete with ethical issues involving misuse of resources, undue influence by lobbyists, backroom deals, leveraging positions for personal gain, influence of business relationships on public business, use of confidential information to obtain personal advantage, human rights issues, and transparency issues.

All these negative actions reported in the news influence the perception of the public with respect to government, not just state or federal government, but local governmental organizations as well. The more negative issues that surface, the more people are inclined to lose confidence in government, ultimately to the detriment of the public good.

- **2. Positives from Ethical Conduct.** So why study ethics? Why talk about it? There are several excellent reasons to discuss and promote ethics in an organization.
  - Promotes a business atmosphere that is perceived as fair and makes businesses want to do business
    with the District, which increases even-handed competition and leads to good value.
  - Attracts and keeps good employees who value an ethical workplace.
  - Avoids litigation.

- Creates favorable public perception increases citizen participation.
- Promotes trust and confidence in the Board, administrative officers and the organization and helps people feel positive about living in and contributing to the community.
- **3.** Everyday Challenges. The fact that the MTD has not faced widespread negative ethical issues belies the fact that the District, as well as any governmental organization, is faced with decisions on a daily basis dealing with transparency and open government, fairness in contracting, basic fairness of District actions, and the promotion of projects which enhance the public welfare, while balancing the interests of private individuals.

Board officials do not face easy decisions on any of these counts. There are always conflicting pressures to advance policies that promote the overall public welfare but at the same time deal respectfully with opposing viewpoints. Further, Board officials often have jobs, own businesses and are members of organizations other than the District. Officials often have questions about how those affiliations and interests interact with their Board leadership.

- **4. The District as a Leader.** The District has frequently been a leader in many areas over the years:
  - Operationally, the District maintains first-rate public services.
  - Innovative programs enhance already excellent transit service.

The District can be a leader in the area of ethics as well.

While the State requires certain training for local government officials, including training in the requirements of Open Meetings Act and the Freedom of Information Act, there is no required overview of ethical issues or systematic training in the area of ethics for elected officials. While the District can rely to a certain extent on ethics training provided by the Attorney General websites, most of these training elements are done in private, (i.e. the Attorney General's training can be done online). There is rarely public discussion of ethical issues.

**5. Why Should the Board Discuss Ethics?** The tone of the District is set not only by management staff but more importantly by the policy, leadership, and example of the Board of Trustees. The Board is in the position to fully articulate the philosophy and values of the organization and provide visible support for high ethical standards, encourage formal and informal conversations about ethical issues, review existing policies and procedures for promotion of values and, in short, institutionalize ethics as an important priority for the organization.

Ethics goes to the character of the organization. The ethical environment determines the right way for employees to proceed. The Board has, by its discussions, set the tone in many areas. Like any relationship, including the relationship between the District and the community, it is important to talk about these issues and articulate the District's goals and values.

**6.** A Proposed Course of Action. How does the Board determine what is the best manner of proceeding toward a discussion of ethical issues?

The Board must consider the law, the Board rules, and the Board's policies.

a. Staff Can Present More Information. Some of the possibilities for discussion are as follows:

The District's legal counsel can provide a series of short presentations which include current ethical issues and the impact of new technology as segments of Board meetings devoted to various ethical components, tentatively:

- Open meetings;
- · Freedom of information;
- "Conflicts of interest".

This possibility would entail presentation to the Board by staff and discussion related to these issues. The discussion would touch on the legal aspects of all of these issues by way of discussion of recent legal decisions, including recent Attorney General and Public Access Counselor opinions and case law decisions relative to certain aspects of these topics. There may be other areas that the Board wishes to discuss and consider. Direction and other ideas from the Board proposed at the initial discussion will be incorporated into the future presentations and discussion.

**b.** Discussion of the Impact of Technology. Discussion concerning the impact of technology on ethical values is important. Whether the technology is in the form of social media (e.g. live broadcasting via Facebook or other platforms) increased surveillance via camera, or other potential technologies, it is important to have some public discussion with respect to the impact of these technologies on the citizens and on the ethical fabric of the District. One only has to read the papers or surf the Web to find these issues surfacing in community after community. In any event, it would be the intention to propose to discuss, either as part of a larger discussion of the proposed ethic topics or independently, the impact of social media and the internet on ethical considerations involving Board members and staff members.

#### E. Alternatives:

- 1. Provide direction regarding future discussions regarding ethics from among the concepts provided above.
- 2. Provide other direction.

#### F. Discussion of Alternatives:

**Alternative 1** would provide direction regarding future ethics discussions from among the concepts provided above.

#### a. Advantages

- Even by deciding which way to proceed, the Board is making a statement concerning the importance of ethics.
- The discussion and direction that the Board will provide the staff will provide the

community with both the impression and the reality that the Board considers these matters important and worthy of discussion.

#### b. Disadvantages

- Would require staff preparation.
- Would consume a portion of Board meetings.

**Alternative 2** would be not to proceed with additional discussion in the format suggested or to provide other direction.

#### a. Advantages

- The Board could decline to go in any particular direction at this time and deal with the
  issues on a more ad hoc basis and be updated as staff deals with new decisions and
  legislation from the State Legislature.
- Would save staff and Board time.

#### b. Disadvantages

- The Board will not engage in focused discussions.
- The organization would not receive the benefit of Board and public discussion.
